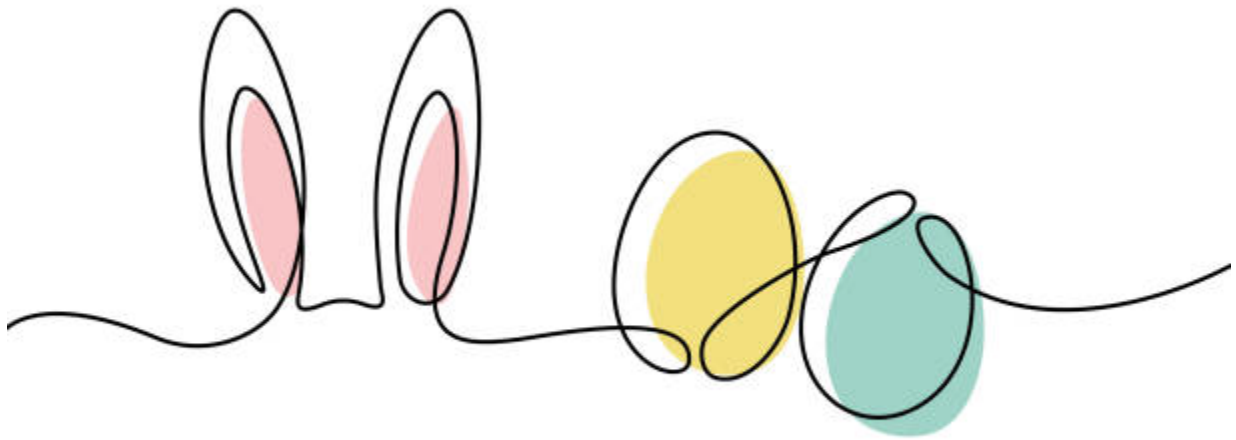

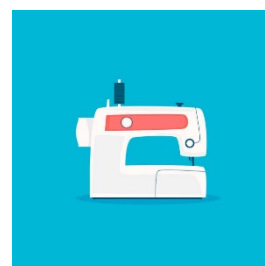

***MEDICAL VAN GUIDELINES**

***There May Be Cancellations Or Changes In Guidelines Or Schedules**
- Please Bear With Us -

- * Van transportation is for medical appointments only, except Friday mornings.
- * Van transportation is limited to a 7 mile radius from the Senior Center.
- * Van will travel to Mercy Hospital and Mercy Ambulatory Center.
- * All transportation appointments must be scheduled and approved **THREE** Days in advance by calling: 827-6669.
- * First pickup is at 9:15 am.
- * Last incoming pick up is at 4:15 pm.
- * No medical van Pickups on Friday mornings from 9:00 am – 1:00 pm.
- * EVERY FRIDAY morning this van will transport seniors to Tops, Wegmans or Market in the Square. (These locations will be alternated).

IMPORTANT: To schedule a medical van outside the 7 mile radius, you must call:

***SENIOR VAN GUIDELINES**

- * Senior Van transportation is to and from the Senior Center.
- * On Mondays, Wednesday, and Fridays (From 1pm - 4pm), the Senior Van will transport to and from banking, dollar store, etc.
- * On Tuesdays at 1pm the Senior Van will transport to and from Save A Lot.
- * On Thursdays at 1pm the Senior Van will transport to and from Aldi's.

EASTER FUN FACTS

1. According to the Farmer's Almanac, Easter Sunday always occurs on the first Sunday following the full moon that occurs on or after the **March or spring equinox**. To simplify the matter, the Christian Church always uses March 21 as the spring equinox date.
2. The "Easter Bunny" who visits children on Easter morning, was an invention of German Protestants; the "Easter Hare," brought eggs and sweets to "good children," in the same way that Santa Claus brought gifts to well-behaved youngsters.
3. More than 1.5 million Cadbury Crème eggs are produced every year.
4. The World's Largest "Easter Egg" stands 31ft tall and is 18ft wide. It is located in Vegreville, Alberta, Canada. The egg weighs a hefty 5000 lbs and took 12,000 hours to complete.
5. The practice of coloring Easter eggs comes from a Ukrainian tradition. The Ukrainians have been decorating eggs as a calling out to the Gods and Goddesses of health and fertility. This traditional act of pysanka ("pih-sahn-kah") is made by using wax and dyes, but this colorful custom didn't take off until Ukrainian immigrants came to the U.S.
